Accomplished, Riveting... And Elite!

“My daughter Abby just celebrated two years as the co-business owner of Elite Performance Automotive in Concord,” begins an email from Dana Biscotti Myskowski. “Seeing the call for the ‘Rosies of NHTI’ in the last alumni newsletter, I think she would make a riveting story – but I am a bit biased!”

Riveting indeed.

At the tender age of 24, **Abigail “Abby” Myskowski** has already accomplished more than some folks twice her age. A resident of Henniker, NH, Abby attended John Stark High School in Weare for a brief time.

“It was difficult,” Abby remembers, “In a way, it was difficult because it seemed too easy for me. The bottom line was that I was bored.” She was earning straight A’s in honors classes when she asked her mom to consider homeschooling her, as her older brother had done. A professor at UNH Manchester, Dana readily agreed.

“At age 15, Abby’s math skills were beyond mine so we signed her up for a math class at NHTI,” Dana recalls. After six months of homeschooling and having passed her 16th birthday, Abby tested and passed her General Educational Development (GED) requirement. Then she enrolled full-time at NHTI.

“I had been accepted to a state university in Vermont,” Abby says, “but you were not allowed to have a car on campus for the first two years. I really wanted that freedom and I was already familiar with NHTI. Since I really didn’t know what I wanted to do, it was the perfect choice for me.”

She especially loved the one-to-one time with her professors

at NHTI. Majoring in Liberal Arts, Abby took classes in photography, woodworking, ceramics, and drawing.

“One of my favorite classes was sports psychology. There I was, the one person with absolutely no knowledge of sports, surrounded by athletes,” Abby laughs. “It was the best course, and I learned so much!”

In 2011, Abby graduated from NHTI with honors. Most impressive is the fact that Abby earned her Associate Degree at age 18, while her peers were graduating from high school.

NHTI Offers Expanded Function Dental Auxiliary Program

With the help of the New Hampshire Dental Society and Northeast Delta Dental, NHTI recently implemented an Expanded Function Dental Auxiliary (EFDA) Program to expand the credentials and skills of dental assistants and dental hygienists in order to elevate their role in caring for dental patients.

"The need for people trained in dentistry is on the rise," says NHTI's **Lynnea Adams**, CDA, BA, who is the EFDA program coordinator at the college. "Having this program up and running is an important development for nonprofits and private practices because it trains dental assistants and dental hygienists to administer advanced care, while allowing dental teams to help more patients each day."

Dental assistants and hygienists with EFDA certification are qualified to place, contour and adjust the materials used in restorative procedures, following the removal of decay by the dentist. NHTI's rigorous eight-week program takes place from June to December and is offered through NHTI's Business Training Center. Tuition for the program is currently \$6,500.

After completing NHTI's 270-hour training program, which includes 120 hours of clinical training with a sponsoring dentist, EFDA candidates must register with the NH Board of Dental Examiners. An EFDA must work under the direct supervision of a licensed New Hampshire dentist, and complete additional continuing education coursework every two years.

The first class of ten students entered the EFDA program in May 2016 and completed their clinical training in the fall. They now play key roles within their respective dental practices, allowing those practices to run more efficiently while helping to treat more patients.



"I love being an EFDA!" says **Misty Griffin**, CDA, EFDA, of Riverview Dental Associates in Concord, who is among those first ten graduates. "I have a lot more freedom. I choose who I'm going to work on, and can see more patients who are underserved. I'm more knowledgeable, and the patients think it's wonderful. This is what I've been waiting for."

Meranda Chandler '15, Early Childhood Education, Returns "Home"

Meranda Chandler came to live at Kurn Hattin Homes for Children -- a private philanthropic home and school for children from 5 to 15 in Westminster, VT -- when she was 6 years old. She lived and studied there for nine years, went off to boarding school and NHTI, and now has returned -- as a houseparent!

When Meranda graduated from Kurn Hattin, she went to Milton Hershey, a high school in Hershey, Penn. "I've been in boarding school all my life," she says, "but I knew it was best for me, a great opportunity."

She says that Milton Hershey, a much bigger school, prepared her for living on her own at college. "Your senior year they let you live in a dorm they call Transitional Living," she explains. "When you live in TL, you're pretty much on your own. They expect you to do what you need to do on your own, without them telling you to do things at a certain time."

"Luckily I had that experience in my senior year," she went on. "When I went to college I realized it was the same thing. At MHS we had a staff that was there to make sure everything was OK, and it was similar to living in a college dorm with a resident advisor."

Immediately after graduating from Milton Hershey, Chandler enrolled at NHTI, where she earned an associate degree in Early Childhood Education. "I always dreamed of working with kids," she says. "I have many goals in life. I love fashion and want to be a fashion designer, but there's something about kids — they always make me smile."

She was sitting in the living room with her mother when they saw an ad for the houseparent position at Kurn Hattin.

"I thought, Why not apply?" Chandler remembers. "I have the credentials for it, I have the background, I'm familiar with it — why not try it? I applied, and a month later I got a call."

Meranda's job at Kurn Hattin, is wide-ranging. "A houseparent is pretty much like a mother-father role," she explains. "I wake them up for school, make sure they're dressed appropriately — we have a school dress code — make sure they get to sports on time and homework is done, make sure they address their physical and emotional needs. It's a typical family role."

"Each week can be different," she continues. "There might be a long week, but this is my home. As a houseparent we do so much in general, making sure the kids are ready for sports, music, performance, families ... the downside could be, we don't sleep. But it's worth it. There's nothing better than waking up and realizing that you're improving a child's life; you're making them feel loved."

Meranda feels that her experience growing up at Kurn Hattin helps her relate to the children in her charge. "I always tell them, I know your point of view, I was once a student here," she says. "They look at me and realize, She's right. They're going to be fine. I always tell them — they're fine."



Bill Walden, '96 Helps Instruct NHTI Students on the Art & Science of Brewing Craft Beer

Could you imagine having two exciting and rewarding careers – happening at the same time? **Bill Walden** can because he does!

Bill earned his degree in Paramedic Emergency Medicine from NHTI in 1996. He attended Western Wisconsin Technical Institute in LaCrosse Wisconsin, where he gained a degree in Respiratory Therapy.

Today he works as a Respiratory Therapist at Concord Hospital. What is the second exciting career? It's being the co-owner and craft beer brewer at OddBall Brewing in Suncook, NH.

Having been an avid home brewer since 2001, Bill says, "I've dreamed about opening a small, local brewery to create imaginative, well-crafted, great tasting beer."

In 2014, Bill's wife, Sherri (a 2005 graduate of NHTI's nursing program) found the perfect location for the brewery. After spending 15 months doing demolition and then construction with business partner, Mark Ferguson, OddBall Brewing opened its doors in November 2015.

"The business is designed around who we are as individuals, and follows our moral and ethical compasses," explains Bill. "One of our core tenets is to be part of the community and to be educators about the wonderful world of beer."

When a colleague at Concord Hospital mentioned that NHTI was offering a

new course – CHEM 115C Brewing: the Science Behind Beer – Bill immediately seized the opportunity to get involved. He contacted Professor **Tracey Lesser** and offered OddBall Brewing as a place for students to learn the craft.

On Giving Back to NHTI Students

Bill isn't new to the idea of giving back to NHTI students.

"As an NHTI graduate, I've been able to act as a preceptor to subsequent classes of Paramedic students," Bill explains. "I did this as both a Paramedic as well as in my current capacity as a Respiratory Therapist. Opening OddBall to Professor Lesser's students seemed a natural way for me to continue giving back to NHTI. Mark and I look forward to a great working relationship with Professor Lesser, the students and with the College."

Building Inspector Program Honors First Graduates

On January 11, 2017 at the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Hall in Concord, NHTI and 50 members of the New Hampshire Building Officials Association honored the first six graduates of one of the school's newest programs, the Building Inspector and Plans Examiner (BIPE) Certificate Program. The new certificate holders – four men and two women – hailed from across the Granite State: **Bill Booth** of Nottingham, **Mike Cummings** of Allenstown, **Norma Ditri** of Keene, **Steve Martin** of Concord, **Dawn Michaud** of Nashua, and **Corey Rider** of Wolfeboro.

Launched in Fall 2015, this three-semester, 18-credit-hour program prepares students to critically examine permit applications and plans for residential, commercial, and other building types, and to subsequently ensure that the construction of buildings with permits is conducted in accordance and within the provisions of relevant building codes. The program can help experienced construction workers transition into a new career, or provide the foundation of a new career for those just out of high school.

Tedd Evans, Chief Building Inspector for the City of Concord and an instructor in the program says, "Many of the people currently working in this profession are baby boomers, and will be retiring soon. Unfortunately we're finding it difficult to attract younger people to the profession to replace them.

"Many people now working as inspectors got into it mid-career, like I did, after working in the construction world. But we had to learn on-the-job because there was no place to get training, especially for things like construction law. NHTI's new certificate program would put anyone – even a high school graduate with no construction experience – at the top of the list for an inspector's position, because they would already have the theoretical knowledge required."

New BIPE graduate Dawn Michaud, who currently works as a Plans Examiner for the City of Nashua, says, "I feel very lucky to be part of this fledgling program – the only one of its kind in the nation." With some 85% of New Hampshire's inspectors approaching retirement age, Dawn says that expanding her skill set will open up a wide variety of jobs she can perform, enlarging her choice of occupations in the future.

The BIPE program meets in the evening, and is financial aid eligible. All courses are three credits. Students may sign up for individual courses, as well as for the certificate.



NHTI Grad Dies in Line of Duty

Staff Sgt. David J. Whitcher Sr., 30, died November 2, 2016 during a dive training exercise off the coast of Key West, FL.

He was born on July 4, 1986 in New London, the son of Horace

"Bud" and Kathleen (Morrison) Whitcher. David grew up in Bradford. He knew from the age of six that he wanted to serve in the military, and that's just what he did, joining the Army after high school and gaining the Honor Grad Award in basic training 2004, serving two combat tours in Afghanistan and then achieving his dream of becoming a Special Forces soldier-Green Beret.

David enlisted in the New Hampshire National Guard in 2008 as a carpentry and masonry specialist. He earned many awards, the Army Commendation Medal (3rd award), Army Achievement Medal (4th award), Valorous Unit Award, Meritorious Unit Commendation, National Defense Service Medal, Afghanistan Campaign Medal and the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal. David was a student in the Combat Diver Qualification Course (CDQC) assigned to Company C, 2nd Battalion, 1st Special Warfare Training Group, U.S. Army John F. Kennedy Special Warfare Center and School. He also earned an associate degree in Criminal Justice from NHTI in 2012.

In 2013 David came on active duty and was assigned to the 6th Engineer Battalion, 2nd Engineer Brigade, Fort Richardson, Alaska. During this time in Alaska, he volunteered for a humanitarian mission to Palau to rebuild roads, schools and hospitals. In 2014 David volunteered for Special Forces training. He graduated from the Special Forces Qualification Courses in 2016.

David was known best by those who were close to him as a free spirit. He enjoyed the outdoors and spending time with his friends and family. He was amazing at everything he did.

In addition to his mother Kathleen Whitcher of Bristol, he is survived by his wife, Victoria (Stewart) Whitcher of Bristol, his son, David J. Whitcher Jr. of Bristol, his three brothers; Matthew Whitcher of Andover, Danny Whitcher of Chesapeake, Va., and Michael Robbins of North Andover, Mass., and three sisters; April Messer of Newbury, Rebecca Whitcher, of Claremont, and Ruth Koloski of Claremont, and many nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by his father, Horace "Bud" Whitcher in 2015 and one sister, Laurel Coronis.
