


PLANNING AHEAD:

Snow Day Prep for Students

Here are the 5 steps we recommend you take to every inclement weather day to ensure you're set up for academic success:



- 1 Set up a home work space** and schedule your day around other obligations, like shoveling, helping others, or digging your car out of a snow bank.
- 2 Check your syllabus for the day's work and faculty expectations.** Depending on your instructor, you may be required to complete additional at-home work or attend a Zoom session.
- 3 Request a meeting with your instructor** if you have questions or need additional guidance. You don't want to find out too late that a paper deadline was moved!
- 4 Keep track of any updates on the NHTI website.** Weather situations change quickly. We may need to update guidance to fit a shifting forecast. Make sure your info in our NHTI RAVE Alerts is current.
- 5 Enjoy the snow!** Whether you're an outdoor person or prefer the inside, snow days can be a fun break from the expected. Be sure to schedule in some time for you to have some fun.
